Week beginning 13th November 2023

Dear Parents/Carers,

As you know, this week has been Anti-Bullying Week. We kicked off the week wearing our odd socks and discussing how great it is to embrace and celebrate everyone's differences. We also had a special assembly introducing Anti-Bullying Week and our PSHE lessons focused on this too. We thought about what bullying is and what it isn't and, most importantly, what we can do if we think we are being bullied or someone else is being bullied. This year's Anti-Bullying Week theme was 'make a noise' and now we all know that if there is any bullying happening, we need to make a noise and tell a grown-up!

In English this week, we have continued writing key parts from the story 'Nothing', remembering to include the changes we made to it last week. We also had a story invention lesson, in which we worked as a class to orally invent our own story, from beginning to end.

In Maths, we have been thinking about how things around us, such as toys and furniture and even our bodies, are made up of different parts, and that when all of the parts are put together, they make one whole. Similarly, numbers can be broken down into parts; for example, 2 and 3 are parts of 5. When 2 and 3 are put together to make 5, 5 is the whole number.

We started rehearsing our Christmas play in the hall this week and the children thoroughly enjoyed this! You should now all be aware of your child's part in the play and you will have received their lines if they have a speaking part in the play. We really appreciate any time you are able to spend helping your child to practise these at home.

Thank you for continuing to read with your child and for helping them to learn their sounds. This week we learnt ee, ar, oa and or. These digraphs are mostly found in the middle of words and can sometimes be harder to spot than those that feature at the beginning or end or words. Keep an eye out for them in words you see in the environment around you and in books, Ladybirds. Remember to practise reading this week's Rainbow Word, 'my', too.

We've certainly needed our coats on at playtime this week! If you can't already put you coat on and do it up yourself, Ladybirds, keep practising at home. The quicker we all have our coats on and zipped up, the more time we have to play!

Vocabulary we will be introducing next week:

History

Big Ted Little Ted



This game is to help your child learn to follow short instructions that involve the words first and last.

You will need a big and little soft toy. Teddy bears are good for this game. You will also need a sponge or a flannel. Tell your child that you are going to pretend to give the teddies a bath. Give your child instructions to wash different parts of the toys using the words first and last.

e.g. 'Wash little teddy's tummy first and then his toes.'

'Wash big teddy's nose first and then his ears.'

Remember to let your child be teacher and give you instructions to follow. You may need to remind him or her to tell you which toy to wash and what part to wash. Try to encourage your child to tell you both things in one sentence. See if your child can spot your 'mistakes'.

Variations:

To make this game easier get your child to copy what you have done.

To make this game harder use more toys and introduce a towel to dry parts of their body.
