Dear Parents/Carers,

The children have come back to school very excited about their half-term adventures, and we've loved hearing all about them! They also really impressed us with their readiness to learn after the week off.

There has been a lot of enthusiasm from the children this week, as they have got involved with our new theme of Land and Sea. We have begun to read A New Home for a Pirate, and earlier in the week we helped Pirate Jed find his lost gems and treasure keys! The children have also completed their Cold Tasks for this term, and we were so impressed with their concentration and motivation to do well.

In Maths this week, we have been ordering numbers 1-10 and looking at the '5 and a bit' structure of numbers 6-8. We have also focused on recognising the repeating word pattern in the counting sequence beyond 20; that is, for example, knowing that a two-digit number ending in a 2 will always follow a two-digit number ending in a 1.





Vocabulary we will be introducing next week:

The Natural World

- Route a particular way of getting from one place to another
- Destination a place that a person is going to or goods are being sent to

RE

- Place of worship a building where people gather to worship together, such as a church or a mosque
- Church a place of worship for Christians
- Altar a raised table or platform used for religious ceremonies in a church
- Pew a church bench
- Font a basin where Baptisms are performed
- Mosque a place of worship for Muslims
- Prayer mat a mat or small rug that Muslims kneel on when they pray

Shopping



This game is to help your child learn pronouns; he, she and they.

To play this game you will need some everyday objects from around the house e.g. a cup, book, spoon, car, glove, empty food boxes or fruit and vegetables. You will also need some soft toys, or small figures to be the customers.

Set up a 'shop' on a table or the floor. Let your child be the shop keeper while you use the soft toys or small figures to be the customers.

Ask your child to serve each customer by asking you what **he**, **she** or **they** would like. Remember to use the pronouns in your answers so your child hears the words lots of times,

e.g. 'He would like some grapes, she would like some cornflakes and they would like ice-creams.'

Let your child be the customer sometimes and tell you what the customer wants.

You may have to encourage your child to use the right words. If your child makes a mistake repeat the correct word for them,

e.g child: 'Him want crisps.' adult: 'Oh, he wants the crisps. Here you are.'

Variations:

To make this game easier work on just one pronoun at a time.

To make this game harder use lots of items and customers.



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
